Parking on Site:

Directions from North (Ocala)

Head South on I-75 and take the I-275 exit (#274). Take the Bearss Avenue exit (#53). Turn right at Bearss Continue on Avenue. Bearss* Avenue and it will become Ehrlich* Road. Continue on Ehrlich Road and it will become Gunn* Highway. Turn left on Sheldon Road (South). Turn left on Countryside Village Boulevard and continue to the very end to the Clubhouse.

Directions from North (Orlando/Daytona)

Head North on I-75 and take the I-4 exit to Tampa (#261). I-4 will end/merge with I-275. You'll want to take the exit to Tampa Int'l Airport/St Petersburg. Take exit 39 to merge onto Memorial Hwy/ SR-60 W toward Clearwater/ Tampa Airport. Pass the Veteran's Expressway (Toll Road) and turn Left onto Memorial Highway. Continue on Memorial* Highway and it will become Sheldon * Road. Turn right on Countryside Village Boulevard and continue to

the very end to the Clubhouse.

Please note that Bearss Avenue, Ehrlich Road and Gunn Highway are all the same road. It just changes its name as you traverse it. Memorial Highway and Sheldon Road are the same road. It just changes its name as you traverse it. For more concise directions, feel free to contact me and I will guide you on in.

Tampa has many restaurants and hotels for you to enjoy. Close by to the gamesite is Holiday Inn Express (813-885 -3700) and Hampton Inn (813 -901-5900). The Most Important Thing as an Officer

There are several things which are given to those in the coordinator and storyteller branches that range from positive, both in the ways of thanks for their jobs and the prestige they earn, to the negative, such as the problem resolutions as well as the negative feedback that invariably come with these positions. However, there is one portion of the position that simply exceeds both the positive and negative aspects of these positions. It is the single most important thing that they are given.

They are given a measure of trust.

As a coordinator, that trust is nearly always placed with the maintaining and managing of one's prestige. Even though it is mostly the player's responsibility, often it is expected for the coordinator to have a members prestige records on hand for review. More importantly, the gen-

eral members are trusting that their prestige is taken care of accurately.

Trust also comes in the form of dispute resolution, which the coordinator is the second step in the resolution process, when the first step of resolution between the offended members simply cannot be resolved. It is up to the coordinator at those times to try and see things from each member's perspective and find a compromise when there is one, or enforcing the rules when one is found to be in the wrong. As with anything in life, there's the right way and the easy way. It is important while in a position of authority to always choose the right way.

Storytellers face many of the same challenges. When crafting plots and implementing rules calls, it is important to keep all members in mind, as well as keeping everything fair and balanced. Keeping things

balanced and fair is difficult in a make believe world of trickery and deceit. For Storytellers it can be an even tougher job as the lines between black and white simply aren't as well defined as they are on the coordinator side. Many character approvals and on the spot rules calls when the rules aren't handy must be done by arbitrary decisions. The trust there is between the players trusting their Storyteller's staff to maintain the integrity of the story rather than members simply getting what they want.

In the end, positions aren't about prestige, or power placements within the organization. They are about helping make a better organization. The only way to accomplish this is through the trust of the membership in their elected officials, and officials keeping that trust.
