

Caribbean Inspired Dishes

Jerk Chicken

- 1 large onion, chopped
- 2-3 scotch bonnet peppers, seeded and minced
- 1 teaspoon thyme
- 1 Tablespoon granulated garlic
- ½ cup lime juice
- 1 cup soy sauce
- ½ cup brown sugar
- 1 teaspoon coarse ground black pepper
- ½ teaspoon coriander seed
- ½ teaspoon nutmeg
- ½ teaspoon cinnamon

8 boneless skinless chicken thighs or breasts



Caribbean Pickled Cucumbers



1 medium red onion, thinly sliced

- 1 cup lime juice
- 2 teaspoon sea salt
- ¼ cup granulated sugar
- 1 scotch bonnet pepper, seeded and minced
- 1 cup fresh parsley, chopped
- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup fresh dill, chopped
- 4 English cucumbers, peeled and sliced thin

In a large bowl, mix together onion, lime juice, salt, sugar, pepper, parsley and dill. Toss with cucumber slices and chill for at least one hour.

Pineapple Pound Cake

- 2 sticks butter, softened
- 3 cups sugar
- 1 cup sour cream
- 2 cans Crushed pineapple in juice, drained (reserve liquid)
- ½ teaspoon baking soda
- 3 cups AP flour
- 6 large eggs
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 2 cups powdered sugar



Preheat oven to 325. In a large mixing bowl cream butter and sugar. Add sour cream, half of the pineapple, half of the reserved liquid and eggs. In a second bowl, sift the baking soda and flour together and add slowly to the wet mixture. Grease and flour a large bunt pan. In the bottom put the rest of the drained pineapple and spread evening. Carefully spoon the cake batter into the pan. Bake for 1 hour 20 minutes or until tooth pick comes out clean. Remove from pan and allow to cool slightly. In a medium bowl combine remaining pineapple juice with powdered sugar and drizzle over the top of the cake. Serve warm or cooled.
